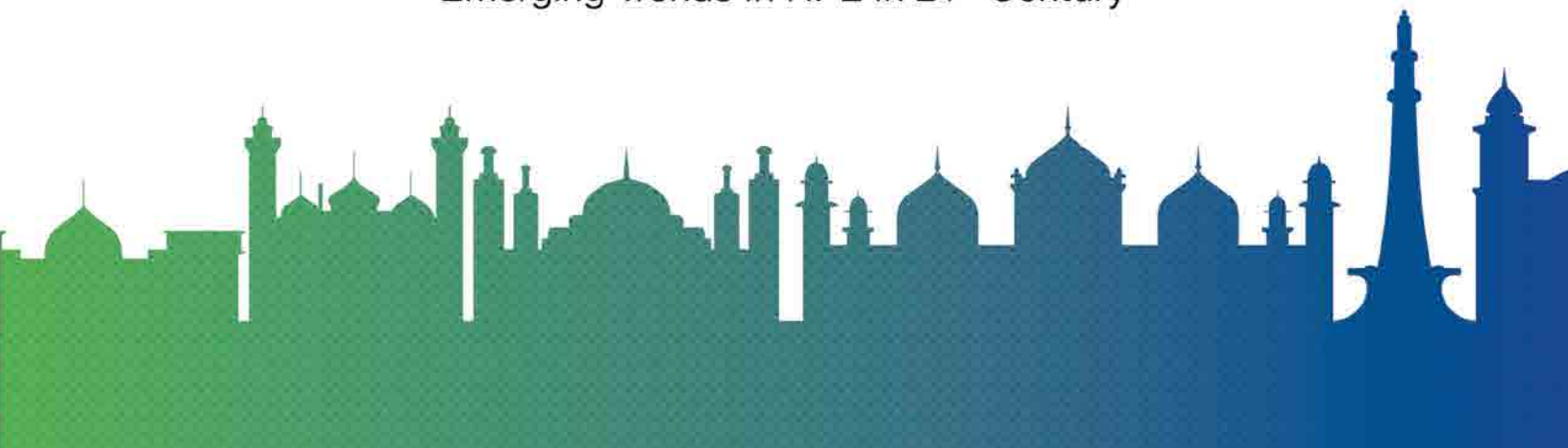

THE CONTRIBUTION OF PAKISTANI-EDUCATED PHYSICIANS TO THE INTERNATIONAL HEALTH WORKFORCE

Many physicians educated in Pakistan complete their graduate training in the United States (US) and then go on to practice medicine outside of Pakistan. Based on the American Medical Association (AMA) Masterfile (2018), there are 13,348 physicians in active practice in the US who obtained their medical degree in Pakistan. Nearly 29% (n=3,790) specialized in internal medicine. Most of these physicians (51%) attended 1 of 3 medical schools (Dow Medical College, King Edward Medical University, Aga Khan University Medical College).

International medical graduates (IMGs) must be certified by the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) to be eligible to enter accredited graduate medical education (GME) programs in the US. The certification process includes credential verification and successful completion of the United States Medical Licensure Examination (USMLE) Steps 1 and 2. In 2023, physicians applying for ECFMG certification will also be required to graduate from a medical school that has been appropriately accredited. ECFMG certification requirements, combined with global economic and political changes, could impact the flow of international medical graduates to the US and other countries. From 2009 to 2016, the number of ECFMG applicants from individuals who attended medical school in Pakistan increased from 755 to 1178. In 2017, applications from Pakistani medical schools dropped to 1,103. The number of ECFMG certificates issued to graduates of medical schools in Pakistan decreased by 95 between 2016 (n=768) and 2017 (n=673).

ASSESSMENT OF PERSONAL QUALITIES AT THE 'IS' LEVEL

Assessment in the post-psychometric era moved from pure objectivity to encompass a more holistic and subjective notions. New domains for assessment have emerged over the past few years (beyond individual's knowledge and competence), that proved to have a great impact on the future careers of health professionals. Assessors became more concerned to enrich their toolbox with valid methods and protocols to assess the personal qualities of their candidates, not at the Knows, Shows or Does, but at the 'Is' level. The key question is: What are the salient personal qualities (at the Is level) that can be taught/assessed or selected in medical students on admission, without being too judgmental?

TWELVE TIPS FOR EFFECTIVE DESIGN AND INTEGRATION OF VIRTUAL PATIENTS IN MEDICAL EDUCATION

A VP is recognized in the context of medical education as an interactive computer simulation of a real-life clinical scenario for the purpose of teaching, learning and assessment. Although VPs are being applied at an increasing rate and with growing levels of success in developing clinical reasoning skills, and are generally positively perceived by both learners and medical teachers, there is still a call for more research to disclose how VPs can be effectively integrated into a curriculum. The presentation is going to provide tips on the effective design and integration of VPs into a medical curriculum.

DEVELOPING ACCREDITATION SYSTEM FOR MEDICAL & DENTAL COLLEGES IN PAKISTAN: WHOSE STANDARDS ARE THESE?

There is a growing trend towards quality assurance and accreditation of medical schools worldwide. Globally, countries use accreditation and standards as regulatory mechanisms to ensure the quality of medical education, and in turn healthcare. Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) and Committee on Accreditation of Canadian Medical Schools set standards and accredit medical schools in the USA and Canada respectively. Ireland, Australia and many other countries have adapted World Federation for Medical Education (WFME) standards for accreditation purpose. WFME published first set of standards for Basic Medical Education in 2003 and further refined them in 2012 and 2015, based on feedback from international experts. Their purpose is to encourage self-evaluation and bring improvements among institutions providing medical education. WFME has already provided recognition status to seven accreditation agencies (from Japan, Caribbean, Korea, USA, Canada and Turkey) and several others (from Thailand, Sudan, Brazil, Mexico, Egypt etc.) are under review. WFME recognition, although not mandatory, helps in establishing global credibility of national accreditation agencies and strengthens collaboration among them. WFME standards are structured under nine areas with 35 sub-areas, at two levels: 'basic standards' or minimum requirements; and relatively advanced standards called 'quality standards'. Basic standards are mandatory while quality standards are optional. Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PM&DC) has long history of recognizing medical and dental colleges based on inspection criteria developed by PM&DC experts. There is a need to review the current PMDC standards and develop an accreditation system within the PM DC that is responsive to the needs of Pakistani medical and dental colleges and has the capacity to respond to global recognition as well. PM&DC needs to take all stakeholders in confidence while developing the new accreditation system and standards. This presentation will present a framework on how such accreditation system can be developed at the PM&DC.

POLITICS AND PEDAGOGY OF MEDICAL EDUCATION

The health science curricula should be built on pedagogical approaches and not executive decisions. This can ensure that the health professionals training institutions are graduating competent and safe practitioners for tomorrow. The development and implementation of curriculum is not a one-dimensional process ironically it is influenced by multiple forces. These forces in general include in addition to academicians and relevant stake holders political waves of the community and country. Ideally a curriculum of a health institution should be in sync with health issues of the country and match the ability of the providers (faculty and managers) and receivers (students). The politics of curriculum and health reform in general is not an undesirable process as long as the politics does not take over the pedagogy.

This paper will discuss the positive and negative connotations associated with politics of medical education and highlight the importance of a curriculum build on contemporary evidence and takes into account the resources available and the health needs of the community.

LEARNING IN THE CLINICAL SETTING: WORKPLACE CLINICAL TEACHING MODELS

Teaching in the clinical environment is a demanding, complex and often frustrating task, a task many clinicians assume without adequate preparation or orientation. The clinical environment consists of inpatient, hospital outpatient and community settings, each with their own distinct challenges. The dual role of a Clinical Teacher is to teach as well as to see patients and how to balance is a challenge. Clinical Teaching is compromised and there are identified problems and challenges.

The development of learners' diagnostic competence remains a major challenge for every clinical teacher. Various workplace models of clinical teaching have been described in literature, including; One minute preceptor, mini-CEX, SNAPPS, MiPLAN, Cognitive Apprenticeship Model etc.. 12 Tips, MiPlan model and Stanford Faculty Development models can be considered for Inpatient teaching. One minute Preceptor Model can be used in inpatient, outpatient and all clinical settings. SNAPPS is for outpatient setting. Cognitive Apprenticeship Model can be applied to any clinical setting

THE NEGLECTED POWER OF VIRTUAL LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS (VLE)

A virtual learning environment (VLE) is a set of teaching and learning tools designed to enhance a student's learning experience by including computers and the internet in the learning process. The principal components of a VLE package include curriculum mapping (breaking curriculum into sections that can be assigned and assessed), student tracking, online support for both teacher and student, electronic communication (e-mail, threaded discussions, chat, Web publishing), and Internet links to outside curriculum resources. VLE are focused on online learning delivery but support a range of uses like blended learning and flipped classrooms. Most of the universities in Pakistan is having and LMS installed. However, majority of them are using this powerful tool at very minimum level. In this presentation, presenter share his experience of development of distance learning unit in Universities, logistics requirements, training of faculty as well as development of advance learning contents in flash and html5 and integrating them with

VLE as SCORM packages. Some demonstration of learning contents also shared with the audience.

QUALITY ASSURANCE OF HEALTH CARE IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

Quality assurance is that set of activities that are carried out to establish standards and improve performance so that care provided is as effective and as safe as possible. Until recently, quality assurance was primarily used by hospitals in developed countries. However, several characteristics of the quality assurance approach make it very appropriate for developing countries. We investigated the state of quality assurance of health care in developing countries utilizing the data from Primary Health Care Operations Research (PRICOR) conducted by the World Health Organization (1985-1992). We also obtained information from the Amono-Lartson study (1984) as well as Sauerborn study (1989).

The infrastructure and resources for quality assurance in developing countries are poorly developed because of scarcity of human resources, equipment and finances to run such initiatives. The focus in assessment of quality has been put primarily on availability of healthcare rather than on document-based analysis of the process of care. There is lack of organized indigenous efforts to set up standards of care appropriate for local communities.

Quality assurance is the main tool for quality improvement in developing countries. It should be oriented towards meeting the needs and expectations of the community. It should focus on systems and processes and utilize data to analyze service delivery processes. A team approach is essential for problem solving and quality improvement

PROFESSIONALISM: SHOULD IT BE TAUGHT OR DEMONSTRATED?

Professionalism is being introduced as a subject in the latest curriculums of Medical and Dental Colleges, primarily being fostered by Medical Education Departments. Unfortunately, in our cultural context of academic centers and the behaviour that our faculty models, are often inconsistent with the formal teaching of professionalism and its acceptable universal standards.

Various definitions of professionalism have been carved to inculcate altruism, accountability, excellence, honor, integrity and respect for others, but as all these qualities are not knowledge based or technical in nature, therefore their teaching solely as a subject cannot achieve the desirable objectives.

In this presentation our goal is to challenge medical educators to engage in open dialogue as to identify the suitable tools of teaching and assessing professionalism along with the construction of incentives that demonstrates that the profession truly values these attributes. Additional parameters may also need to be identified to reconcile the gap between our aspirations and the reality on the ground.

Recent surveys show that most of medical and dental schools in the western world, does include formal instructions of professionalism, but still requires evidence about best practices aimed at achieving desired goals that are demonstrated by the graduates of those institutions. It has always been cautioned that, “The quality of medical education must be evaluated by what it produces.”

It has thus been suggested by reviewing various studies that role modeling through informal and hidden curricula, coupled with incentives to behave professionally could reveal meaningful and long-lasting results as compared to formal teaching through one or multiple courses.

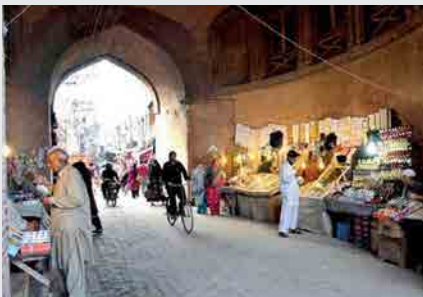
